Note: This was the highlight of the conference for me. It was an excellent time for all the speakers and representatives to unwind and discuss our work and organizations with a bit detail, more or less, and make plans for future collaborations. One item that came up is the representative from CamTESOL offering to potentially work on building a new website for KOTESOL.

#### **Conference Review**

Conference registration started at 7:30am on Friday with the keynote speaker, Prof. Werasit Sittitrai giving her opening presentation from 8:40 to 9:40am. She was very passionate and discussed the importance of the teacher's ability to inspire their students. She encouraged embracing education with progressive thinking and discussed the importance of a globalized framework as well as the necessity of digital literacy.

Plenary sessions were 45 minutes long and took place in the large convention hall. The hall was divided into three smaller sections to allow for more presentations throughout the event. The first plenary speaker, Prof. Farzad Sharifian, brought technical language into the mix to discuss the topic of intercultural competency. It was informative to say the least. When he and I spoke, he mentioned coming to Korea to present at one of our conferences but I could not find his information archived anywhere. The next speaker, Marsha Chan, gave an excellent presentation on teaching and studying (American) English pronunciation. She has a radiant personality and takes command of the stage. I think she would be an excellent person to invite to a KOTESOL conference. I was unable to see the third plenary speaker, Roy Cross, but heard he gave an interesting presentation on his 40 years of experience as an ESL/EFL professional in East Asia.

As mentioned, the keynote speaker had an hour timeslot and the plenary speakers were given 45-minute timeslots. There were 8 featured speakers who were given 45-minute time slots right after lunch. Throughout the conference, there were 137 parallel sessions (30-minute time slots), 47 demonstrations and workshops (45-minute time slots), 17 poster presentations, 3 special sessions, 2 colloquia, and 4 graduate student scholarship presentations.

The venue was an excellent choice for an academic conference. The facilities were clean, the area was spacious and allowed for a warm and friendly atmosphere throughout the conference. It is hard to be unhappy when you are well-fed and in such a welcoming environment. This is one area where the conference decidedly outshines any event I have attended in Korea. Additionally, the staff and volunteers organizing the conference were accessible and accommodating and very visible. The conference was very well-organized. Vendors were given

space in the center of the conference and all attendees must walk through as they enter the hotel. Our table was located on the second story of the hotel in a central location between presentation areas meaning a lot of foot traffic and exposure. Signage was posted around the conference area and the map in the conference handbook was very easy to understand and well-labeled. Each presentation room had a dedicated conference volunteer to assist with setting up, and they did an excellent job.

A buffet lunch was provided each day of the conference for free to all attendees. Snacks and coffee were provided once each day during a conference-wide coffee break that allowed for a lot of conversation and networking to happen between attendees. Cool water was provided throughout the conference, as well. Vendors and organizational partners were provided with a box lunch on both days.

During my time tabling, I was able to meet dozens of educators from around the world and many of them seemed eager to visit Korea. With any luck, some of them will hopefully join us this October for the International Conference. The majority of attendees were from local institutions, but I was surprised to note the high number of teachers coming from Japan, as well. Korea was one of the least represented countries among guests. It was a nice shift in perspective discussing how ESL/EFL education is handled in other countries.

#### Items Discussed

- Regarding the participation of PAC members using special rate registration, some participants could not participate in the Thailand TESOL conference due to some misunderstanding and the limited period of time.
